

AUDUBON ARTISTS WEBSITE IN MEMORIAM ON SALVATORE J INDIVIGLIA

Salvatore J Indiviglia CDR (USNR-Ret) passed away on Memorial Day, May 28th 2018 with loving family near his home in Franklin Square, NY.

Born November 16th, 1919 and raised in East Harlem, NY. Sal graduated Leonardo da Vinci Art School, School of Industrial Arts and Pratt Institute. He served apprenticeship with his mentor Alfred D Crimi in mural and fresco painting.

Sal served with the U.S. 5th Army during World War II as an interpreter in Italy and as an artist, creating paintings that toured the United States as part of war bonds and recruitment promotions.

Following the war, Sal was an active member of the American Watercolor Society, The Salmagundi Club, Artists Fellowship (Pres. 1960-63), Allied Artist Am, and Audubon Artists. He received 160 art awards for his realistic and abstract paintings. Following his calling for service, in 1962 Sal received a direct commission as a U.S. Naval Reserve Officer and served as a Navy Combat Artist. Sal's artwork of the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps Combat Operations in South Vietnam resides in The Smithsonian Institute and The James N. MacLean Library, Special Collections at Hofstra University, Hempstead, NY. His watercolors depicting Long Island in the 1950's are now display at The Franklin Square Library, Franklin Square Historical Society Collection.

CDR Indiviglia also served as a U.S. Naval Academy Information Officer for twenty-nine years and was awarded the Navy Commendations Medal for his outstanding service. He also served as Commander of American Legion Post 1014.

A sixty-eight year resident of Franklin Square, Sal survived by his daughter, Dianne Indiviglia (FIT Class 77) of Franklin Square, N.Y., son Larry Indiviglia (CDR USNR-Ret USNA Class of 77) of San Diego, Ca. and two grandchildren, Joseph and Lauren. He was pre-deceased by his wife, Quinta (De Simone) Indiviglia, his daughter, Barbara, his son Joseph and his sister, Theresa.
